# **Committees and Expert groups**

# Human Rights and Non-Discrimination Committee

It ensures that national and European leaders are closely involved in, and are fully informed about our work on human rights, equality, non-discrimination and especially on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UN CRPD).

# Social Policy and Inclusion Committee

It contributes to EDF's work on social and employment policy and supports its members by providing expertise on social rights, including the right to work and employment, social protection and full inclusion in society.

#### Women's Committee

It mainstreams gender in all EDF policies and documents, to raise awareness on the situation of women and girls with disabilities and to work towards the inclusion of women and girls with disabilities in society.

#### Youth Committee

Its role is to ensure that EDF's work takes into account the perspective of young people with disabilities but also to represent young people with disabilities in both EDF and external events.

# Chapter 4 2020 achievements by areas of work

## 1. Accessibility

## **European Accessibility Act**

- EDF published a <u>toolkit on transposition of the European Accessibility Act</u> to help members advocacy at national level and presented it in a successful webinar
- We also highlighted the importance of effective transposition at European and national high-level discussions.
- EDF held webinars to support members for national advocacy during transposition of the European Electronic Communications Code (EECC) and the European Audiovisual Media Services Directive (AVMSD). During both webinars the text of the Directives was introduced, and we gave our main recommendations from earlierpublished toolkits. Both EECC and AVMSD highlight accessibility and rights of persons with disabilities.
- EDF continued to campaign for the effective implementation of the Web Accessibility
   Directive. We had a successful online event to highlight the deadline for accessibility
   of public websites in September 2020.
- We also engaged in emerging policy topics, such as the **Digital Services and Markets** Act, and regulatory framework of Artificial Intelligence.
- In September 2020 we met with the Cabinet of Commissioner for Internal Market,
   Thierry Breton and highlighted concerns of persons with disabilities, including in relation to accessibility and digital rights.
- We had another successful year of awarding a scholarship with a student with disability aiming to improve e-accessibility, in partnership with Oracle.

# **Transport and Built environment**

 We held a successful campaign on the Rail Passengers Rights Regulation, including a petition in partnership with WeMove, which gathered almost 60, 000 signatures. As a result of our campaign the revised Regulation reduced pre-notification time for assistance from 48 to 24 hours.





- Together with our national members and European partners, we successfully campaigned for the adoption of the 1<sup>st</sup> European Standard on accessibility and usability of the built environment (EN17210).
- The new EU Sustainable and Smart Mobility Strategy highlighted accessibility and rights of passengers with disabilities as a result of our advocacy.
- We met with European Commissioner for Transport Adina Vălean and presented the concerns of passengers with disabilities.
- We also met with the Cabinet of Commissioner Timmermans to highlight inclusion of persons with disabilities in the EU Green Deal.
- We actively engaged in transport policy-making at European-level, contributing to public consultations, studies and thematic workshops for the evaluation of passengers' rights laws (air, bus & coach, waterway transport), transport infrastructure (TEN-T; TSI-PRM) and for proposal of Year of Rail 2021 initiative.
- We supported the European Commission with the Access City Award campaign, and promoted accessibility of airports through the Accessible Airport Awards in cooperation with ACI-Europe.

#### 2. Children and Youth with disabilities

- EDF published detailed recommendations to influence the <u>EU Strategy on the</u>
   Rights of the Child and the Child Right Guarantee.
   EDF members used the recommendations to take part in the online consultation.
- The EDF Youth Committee published in December a report that illustrates the result of the <u>survey the Youth Committee</u> run between July and October 2020 about the situation of young people with Disabilities in times of COVID-19.
- Three webinars were organised about EU mobility programmes with the presence of the European Commission. The events covered the Erasmus+ and the European Solidarity Corps Programme and the DiscoverEU initiative.
- The Youth Committee representing for the first time EDF as full partner of the European Youth Event (EYE), with the support of MEP Stelios Kympuropoulos organised an event on the situation of Young People with disabilities in times of COVID as part of the online EYE2020.





- The Youth Committee gave workshops to our Croatian members on Independent living and personal assistance, to EURO Desk on the accessibility of events online or physical for young people with disabilities, and on inclusion during a Study Visit session organised by OBESU a youth organization.
- The Youth Committee participated and took the floor during several events: such as
   The Work Convention on Youth an event attended by thousand young people.
- The Youth Committee is part of several advisory boards of projects linked to young people and inclusion. One of them is preparing the online courses for the European Solidarity Corps volunteers where we strongly advocate for the accessibility of the platform and material created.
- o EDF has chaired the Inclusive Mobility Alliance the first half of 2020.
- We have advocated for more inclusiveness in the Reinforcement of the Youth
   Guarantee, the European Commission took several of our recommendations into
   account and we are part of the publication of Standards for quality job offers within the
   Youth Guarantee, published by the European Youth For
- With the Erasmus+ coalition we published a guide for reimbursement of online activity costs and other costs resulting from the pandemic where Captioning Sign Interpretation have been included.

## 3. COVID-19 and its impact on persons with disabilities

EDF responded to the COVID-19 pandemic by organisations meetings and events with members, monitoring the impact of the response on persons with disabilities and reaching out to policymakers at EU and national level.

From the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, we engaged with policy makers at the EU level towards an inclusive COVID-19 response. As a consequence:

- The Fundamental Rights Agency (FRA) increased the amount of information in its COVID-19 Bulletin. The EU CRPD Monitoring Framework published an overview of the COVID-19 related work of each member of the Framework.
- Speakers from the Disability Unit of DG Employment, the European Parliament, the Fundamental Rights Agency (FRA), along with Equinet and ENNHRI took part in a





- webinar on the human rights violations of persons with disabilities in the COVID-19 pandemic.
- EDF, as secretariat of the European Parliament Disability Intergroup, organised the first high-level discussion on the impact of COVID-19 to persons with disabilities.
   Commissioner Dalli participated in this event, along with several EDF members. The event reached an audience of over 500 participants from all over Europe.
- We <u>published open letters to the European Commission</u>, the European <u>Parliament and Council</u> and sent specific letters to Commissioner and EU bodies such as the European Centre on Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC) and the Joint Research Centre. In July, the ECDC published a 'Guidance on the provision of support for medically and socially vulnerable populations in EU/EEA countries and the United Kingdom during the COVID-19 pandemic' that includes persons with disabilities.
- We published strong recommendations on the testing and vaccine roll-out.
- We researched and collected information for the <u>publication of a Human Rights</u>
   Report on COVID-19.

# 4. Human Rights and non-discrimination

- The European Commission adopted several equality strategies that include references to the CRPD and persons with disabilities, including the Gender Equality Strategy, a LGBT Strategy, a new Roma strategic framework and the Action plan on integration and inclusion of migrants.
- We were successful in including disability in the new Victims' Rights Strategy and have become a member of the Victim Support Platform.
- We launched a <u>toolkit on inclusion of refugees with disabilities</u> in DPOs work, collection of good practices on what DPOs and EDF members have done to include the voices and perspectives of refugees and migrants with disabilities in their work and updated of "Your rights in the EU" toolkit.
- We supported our members for the review of their country by the CRPD Committee, including through the organisation of a webinar in preparation of the review of France.
   The reviews were however rescheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.





- We sent an information note to the CRPD Committee experts highlighting European wide issues and encouraging them to issue questions and adopts recommendations on those, including on the implementation of EU legislation such as the web accessibility directive, and the European Accessibility Act.
- We continue to advocate against the draft additional protocol to the Oviedo
   Convention of the Council of Europe and mobilised partners to submit a joint third-party intervention on the interpretation of the Oviedo Convention by the European
   Court of Human Rights.
- We launched an email expert group on human rights and CRPD with an online platform where members can find information on the CRPD, reports of special rapporteurs, human rights report, COVID-19 response, and share information from their countries.

## 5. International Cooperation and Humanitarian Action

- We were invited to meet <u>Commissioner Lenarčič</u>, the new <u>Commissioner for Crisis</u> <u>Management</u> in February, while we met <u>Commissioner Urpilainen</u>, the new <u>Commissioner for International Partnerships</u> in March. We were able to provide detailed proofing on the priorities of the disability movement for the EU's role in international cooperation and humanitarian action.
- We actively were involved in the consultation relating to the new EU Strategy for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities: We sent a joint global and regional DPOs letter focusing on international cooperation to EU leaders, encouraged our members to take part in EC consultations and we secured a panel on international cooperation at the EESC conference "Shaping the EU agenda for disability rights 2020-2030".
- We published a guidance note on the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) Development Assistance Committee (DAC) disability inclusion marker to continue advocating for its use in EU global work.
- We were invited to give a training in inclusive international cooperation at the internal Fundamental Rights Network Seminar organised by DG NEAR, in collaboration with DG DEVCO.





- We organised a series of events on international cooperation including a reception, a conference and different meetings between high level EC policymakers and EDF, the International Disability Alliance and the African Disability Forum whom we welcomed in Brussels.
- We successfully advocated for the inclusion of persons with disabilities in the next EU
   Action Plan on Human Rights and Democracy 2020-2024.
- We successfully suggested <u>concrete initiatives</u> for the inclusion of persons with disabilities in the new EU-African Action plan, together with the African Disability Forum.
- We were invited to participate in the targeted consultation on the EU Action Plan of Gender equality and women's empowerment in external relations.
- We were invited to provide feedback on DG ECHO single form and the inclusion of disability. The single form is Directorate General European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations (ECHO)'s main instrument of Framework Partnership Agreement. Our feedback was done in collaboration with IDDC and concretely resulted in Washington Group questions being recommended for ECHO partners in data gathering, and promotion of meaningful engagement with DPOs. This will improve disability mainstreaming in the EU's 11 billion humanitarian action budget.
- We readjusting our global work in projects to provide an inclusive response to COVID-19, with guidance, <u>resources</u> as well as on-going advocacy with <u>letters to all EU</u> leaders.
- We met with four Directorates working outside the EU to improve the collaboration between the European Commission and the European disability movement.
- We actively contributed to our various international projects including Bridging the Gap,
   Innovation 2 Inclusion (i2i), VIVID-T on volunteering, disability and humanitarian action
   as well as our project in India on DPOs and the Sustainable Development Goals.
- We expanded our work on humanitarian action, disaster risk reduction (DRR) as well as climate change.
- We contributed to the consultations by the UN Partnership on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities on its upcoming new strategy as well as Special Rapporteur on the rights of persons with disabilities on disability-inclusive international cooperation.
- We contributed to the on-going preparation of the Global Disability Summit 2022.





# 6. Social Policy

- o The negotiations around the **new Structural Investment funding Regulations** drew to an end. We advocated intensively on the negotiations between the Parliament and the Council regarding the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF), the European Social Fund Plus (ESF+) and the Common Provisions Regulation (CPR). We were successful in having nearly all EDF's priorities included in the final wording of the text, particularly regarding accessibility requirements for persons with disabilities, ensuring significant investment towards social inclusion, and clarifying the need to invest in community-based services and independent living as opposed to institutional care. This was a very positive outcome after years of work by the EDF secretariat.
- We <u>published our Human Rights Report on Poverty and Social Exclusion of</u>
   <u>Persons with Disabilities</u>. This publication explored the situation of poverty, unemployment and homelessness faced by persons with disabilities prior to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- We gave input to the European Semester process and managed, for another consecutive year, to increase the number of references to persons with disabilities in the Country Reports and the Country Specific Recommendations delivered to the Member States. These references to persons with disabilities also took into account the impact of COVID-19 and the issues EDF had been raising in its advocacy work around the pandemic.
- We built the capacity of our members on the subject of Disability Assessment.
  We ran a webinar on how disability assessment can be aligned with the CRPD, and how we can ensure the freedom of movement of persons with disabilities in the EU through mutual recognition of disability assessment.
- We stepped up our involvement in the European Expert Group on the Transition from Institutional to Community-based Care (EEG). We co-organised the EEG's external meeting to promote its new checklist, a document supporting Commission desk officers in spotting and flagging possible EU investments in institutional care. We also supported the creation of a report on the situation of institutions and





deinstitutionalization in the 27 EU Member States over that past decade. We were also voted to act as Co-Chairs of the EEG from the end of 2020.

# 7. Women and girls with disabilities

- For the first time, women and girls with disabilities were mainstreamed in the new
   Gender Equality Strategy and Gender Action Plan III.
- We sent recommendations on 4 EU consultations on gender equality and women's Rights.
- We organised 4 webinars on the topic of women and girls with disabilities on topics such as COVID-19, ending violence against women and girls with disabilities, and a training on the UN Convention on Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women and its Committee, and on the Istanbul Convention.
- We were successful in reaching mainstream women's organisations and policy makers. For example, our webinar on the impact of COVID-19 on women and girls with disabilities included speakers from the European Women's Lobby, the European Institute on Gender Equality, the Gender Equality Unit of the European Commission and UN Women, and our webinar on ending violence against women and girls with disabilities, speakers from the European Women's Lobby and the cabinet of Commissioner Dalli.
- Members of EDF Women's Committee took part in 9 external events, including an event on gender equality organised by the Croatian Presidency.
- We supported Autism Europe to develop an Easy to Read version of the Istanbul Convention, now available in English, French, German, Lithuanian.
- We published a guide on engaging with the CEDAW Committee. We supported our Greek member in the preparation of a shadow report to the CEDAW Committee.
- <u>EDF Women Voice newsletters</u> reached 200 subscribers and launched thematic articles in some newsletters, including on LBT women, institutional and structural violence, coercion in psychiatry.


